Class will be held Mondays and Wednesdays from 6:00 pm to 8:50 pm in room G2-A. Our course begins January 5, 2004, and ends March 22, 2004. The course is 4 units and transfers to CSU. The final class will meet on Monday March 22nd from 6:00 pm to 7:50 pm.

Course Description

Illustration for Digital Art is designed to give students exposure to a variety of different illustration techniques, an understanding of contemporary illustration practices, and an understanding of graphic design terminology. From class tutorials, lectures, and reviews of contemporary illustration, we will work together to expand and enhance our understanding and appreciation of digital illustration and the work of both traditional and digital illustrators. Utilizing the course textbook, the Internet, and print media we will analyze, explain, and explore illustration concepts and technique. Our course objective is to gain a greater understanding of the Mac OS X operating system, to understand and use Adobe Illustrator efficiently, and to understand the fundamental principles of digital illustration. This course will also address the use of various input devices, file storage and transfer techniques, and output options for print and screen presentations.

Required Textbook

Adobe® Illustrator® 10 Classroom in a Book

ISBN: 0-201-75624-2 This textbook is required for your participation in class. The text costs about \$45 new. Purchase a copy after the first class and bring your textbook with you to every following class meeting. Buying the book used will save you money, but make sure you receive the book's CD-ROM with your purchase.

Attendance Policy

At every class meeting, information will be presented that is not in the required text. Your attendance counts in assessing your final course grade and can truly affect your class experience.

Homework and Journal


