Class will be held Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6:00 pm to 8:50 pm in room G2-A. Our course begins January 6, 2004, and ends March 23, 2004. The course is 4 units and transfers to CSU. The final class will meet on Tuesday March 23rd from 6:00 pm to 7:50 pm.

Course Description

This course, Image Editing for Digital Art, is designed to give students exposure to and knowledge of a wide variety of image editing techniques relating to contemporary art practices. From class tutorials, lectures, and reviews of contemporary media, we will work together to expand and enhance our understanding and appreciation of digital imaging and the work of digital artists. Utilizing the course textbook, the Internet, and print media we will analyze, explain, and explore image editing principles and techniques. Our course objective is to gain a greater understanding of the Mac OS X operating system, while learning how to use the computer as another tool in the creation of art, and understand fundamental principles of creating art through image editing. This course will also address the use of various input devices, file storage and transfer techniques, and output options for print and screen presentations.

Required Textbook

Adobe® Photoshop® 7 Classroom in a Book

This textbook is required for your participation in class. The text costs about \$45 new. Purchase a copy after the first class. Bring your textbook with you to every class meeting. Buying the book used will save you money, but make sure you receive the book's CD-ROM with your purchase.

Homework and Journal


